
Operation Christmas Child Shoebox Appeal

Alpha is a series of sessions exploring the Christian faith. Each talk looks at a different question around faith and is designed to create conversation. Alpha is run all around the globe, and everyone's welcome. It runs in cafés, churches, universities, homes—you name it. No two Alphas look the same, but generally they have three key things in common: food, a talk and good conversation.

There's food...

Whether it's a group of friends gathered around a kitchen table or a quick catch up over coffee and cake, food has a way of bringing people together. It's no different at Alpha. Most sessions start with food because it's a great way to build community and get to know each other. Here at HBC, we enjoy a good home-made two course meal prepared by a variety of teams from around the church.

There's a talk...

The talks are designed to engage and inspire conversation. Usually around thirty minutes long and delivered over about eleven weeks, they are DVD presentations. They explore the big issues around faith and unpack the basics of Christianity, addressing questions from Who is Jesus? and How can we have faith? to Why and how do I pray? and How does God guide us? as well as challenging questions around sickness, suffering and where God is in it all.

There's good conversation...

Probably the most important part of any Alpha: the chance to share thoughts and ideas on the topic, and simply discuss it in a small group. There's no obligation to say anything and there's nothing you can't say (seriously). It's an opportunity to hear from others and contribute your own perspective in an honest, friendly and open environment.

Plans are gearing up for our next Alpha Course at HBC. It begins on **Wednesday 10th January** at 7pm with the Alpha Supper. This is an introductory session designed to give people a taste before signing up for the course and a great opportunity to invite a friend along to. There is a sign up sheet for the Supper on the church noticeboard!

We look forward to exploring life, purpose and meaning together!


From the Plain in Spain...

Dear Prayer Partners for Spain and the Barretts,

Pray for Rain in Spain: please pray for rain, Spain is experiencing one of the worst droughts in 20 years. Everything is tinder dry, the reservoirs are very low and the water authorities are having to determine which agricultural sectors will be allowed water for irrigation.

Pray for Brain in Spain and Catalunya: following the attempts of the Catalan people to force independence from Spain this autumn, please pray for the legal elections being oranised for 21 December. Pray against corruption among

hearts to their need for Jesus Christ. Open air ministry: we have just celebrated 2 years of having an evangelistic team on the street in Alcalá, and we continue to make the most of the dry weather to preach in a number of

politicians of all persuasions, for unity among Christians and that this crisis may open people's

The testing of our faith often comes when those close to us face life-threatening illness. Please pray for Jacob and Julie Bock: the doctors are not going to give Julie any more chemotherapy as it is doing more harm than good. Julie remains determined to manifest the 'life of the Lord' both in evangelism and among the teams, and shares her confidence that the Lord always has the last word and that's good, whatever it is.

Flying a desk: ministry preparation has taken a fair amount of Ken's time recently. He has been preparing to teach in Peru in January (History of the Church, History of the Brethren Movement, Acts of the Apostles, 1 & 2 Samuel and Ephesians). He has also participated in a conference in Madrid, speaking on "An Historical Vision of the Protestant Reformation", as well as teaching a series on "Christians and money" and preaching on Romans at church.

Publications: please pray that, before Ken leaves for Peru in January, there will be time to read the draft manuscript for the book on George Borrow. Most of the copyright and licensing issues have now been addressed, so it is nearly ready for publication. Please also pray that someone would be able to take on responsibility for distributing the national magazine associated with our Training Centre. Alison had hoped to hand this on to a young couple, but their other responsibilities have made that impossible.

Kofi Jaus: please continue to pray for more volunteers and for someone to step up as projects coordinator. The Tuesday morning family clothes project still has the highest attendance and this has a knock-on effect for the monthly Saturday children's club, where recent attendance has stretched the facilities to the maximum. Occasional craft and cooking activities have also seen the enthusiastic demonstrations from a couple of our MB ladies.

Family: Tim is recovering from a surf board gash to his hip. Esther is in Madrid and is making decisions about her future. Thank you for still including all of them in your prayers, despite the distances and the passing of the years!

Thank you to the unknown donor who sent £550 through Echoes on 24 October. As we have few other means of passing on our thanks, we mention it here, hoping that the person concerned is assured of their leading of the Lord to give at this time.

Sports Ministry

Matiza Family

I want to take this opportunity to thank you all for your wonderful welcome during our visit to the UK this autumn. It was great to see you and taking part in your worship service. I also want to thank all the families who invited us into their homes for dinner. I was so encouraged to visit both Moorlands Theological Training College and All Nation Christian College, where I did my theological studies.

We have just completed our planning process for 2018 and we are all excited that we have now aligned our vision with the OM International one which says, "We want to see vibrant communities of Jesus' followers to the least reached communities in Zimbabwe" For 2018, we are targeting eight communities, including millennials, street kids and bushmen.

The next step is to mobilise the local churches nearer to these communities so that we can reach out to these people together. Once the local church understands that it is their responsibility to reach out to these people rather than OM Zimbabwe then continuity will take place.

As Financial Development Facilitator, my desire is to see the financial stability of OM Zimbabwe, so that we will be able to run our programmes. I am also involved in training as well as outreach.

Our Mobilisation Department has introduced Sports Ministry in churches. Children in towns and rural areas spend hours playing with balls they make by wrapping plastic papers together. If you go to these areas holding a real ball, all these children will follow you around. The first step is to train church leaders to use sport as an evangelism tool. Once they are equipped, we can organise churches into a league to play against each other. The point is not to encourage competitiveness, but to gather people to talk about Jesus.

Discipleship Training

We are introducing a Discipleship Training course starting January 2018. We are no longer offering a residential course because of the high charges, but students will be required to come from home Monday to Friday. This is much cheaper as we offer lunch only for students rather than full board. Students will be attached to a remote rural church for three months as part of training before graduating. This will give the students the much-needed experience before being assigned into longer term mission work.

We organise inter-house short term outreach events, where we invite people from different churches to come and participate. We lead the teams into remote parts of Zimbabwe with the Gospel. These communities have never been reached with the Gospel, for example Kanyemba and Siabuwa etc. We also take part in short term outreach organised by churches, as well as assisting churches in organising such events. Once church member started to be involved in outreach, they start to realise their potential and responsibility.

Short-term Outreach

Please pray for:

• Trust as he continues to search for a suitable university.

• Tatenda, who is doing Cambridge AS Level exams.

• Ketani as she continues with her ministry with Smile International.

• John's ministry with OM Zimbabwe.

Following Robert Mugabe's resignation, please pray for:

- A peaceful and democratic transition.
- Zimbabweans to remain united regardless of political allegiance.
- A spirit of forgiveness to prevail people have been hurt for a long time.

Recent Events...

Faith Sharing Training at HBC

We are stewards of a beautiful, hopeful message, and we desire to make it known so that people can encounter Christ for themselves. However, we often don't know where to start when it comes to sharing that message with friends, family and those we meet in our day-to-day lives. Around 30 people came together on the morning of Saturday 11th November to engage in 'Faith Sharing Training'.

The course began by discussing how the Christian story is perhaps not as well known in our communities as we think it is, and so we face the challenge of presenting many facets of the gospel 'from scratch'. People do not necessarily understand what goes on in our churches and most would not be seen dead in one! We recognised, too, the barriers in place in our own experience that sometimes prevents us articulating our faith.

The biggest challenge before us is to avoid getting to the place where people become 'evangelistic projects'. Instead, compelled by the love of Christ, we should engage with people on a one-to-one basis where they are at, listen deeply to them, and then seek to understand what the gospel message might have to say.

To help with this, we explored our understanding of the full scope of the gospel beyond the personal response to Christ's forgiveness, utilising Bruxy Cavey's 'Gospel in Thirty Words' (right page) as a tool for theological reflection.

The morning developed into a series of group discussions exploring how to apply the principles to a variety of scenarios, individuals and settings. We then received some teaching from the Bible on how we can pray and intercede for those who don't yet know Christ.

Plans are afoot to repeat this first session early in the Spring of 2018 and to develop a second session by way of follow on in the Summer Term.

One participant said,

"Seeing so many wanting to hear about sharing their faith was so encouraging. I found it encouraging and affirming and I would like to be sharing together more about those we want to reach and to value this part of our Christian responsibility."





Andrew Clark, Associate Pastor and course facilitator, said, "It was a joy and a privilege to facilitate this training. I was so encouraged by the participants' enthusiasm, engagement and willingness to go a step further in the Christian witness. There is hope!"

As we move forward as a church together, 'leading people into a growing relationship with Jesus Christ', we must engage with every opportunity to develop and grow in our own understanding and spiritual passion for the work we are called to do. Keep a watch for the repeat of session one and the follow up session coming in the early part of 2018.

Mission Weekend

It was a great pleasure and privilege to welcome John and Ketani Matiza at our Mission Weekend on October 14th and 15th. On the Saturday about 60 of us met in the church hall and had a meal together with John and Ketani. They shared with us their love and passion for their country, Zimbabwe.

John is finance director for OM Zimbabwe, but is also involved in teaching local pastors and leaders. During the year they go out to one of the more remote areas, training a group of pastors and spend a week spreading the gospel in the surrounding villages. Despite their own material needs they have a vision for sending out workers to other countries.

Ketani continues to work with Smile International and organises a feeding programme for over 1200 children each week. These children are at school but are orphans and would have little or nothing to eat if it wasn't for Smile. At one point Ketani had to drive the truck to the various schools and villages but now she has someone to do the driving for her.

They updated us on news of the children. The eldest, Trust, is taking a gap year and hopes to go to university next year, possibly in South Africa. Their eldest daughter, Tatenda, did very well in her exams and Ratidzai and Takunda are thriving too.

During their time with us, and despite the many tensions that they face, it was possible to spend much time laughing together, especially when we talked about the way we 'do church' in the UK with one eye constantly on the clock. In Zimbabwe, although they have the technology, everyone ignores the time. Both approaches have their problems and it was good to laugh with each other.

As well as hearing from John and Ketani, a prayer room was set up in the crèche. All the most recent news from our mission partners was displayed. Many of the support co-ordinators, who ensure that we receive regular news and that our partners are supported, were present, and our thanks goes to them for

their continuing service. Several church members also provided information about other missionaries and workers around the world.


